RE: Harris County Attorney Payments for Indigent Defendants

Date: October 21, 2020

The Audit Division is issuing this consulting engagement memo to provide you with the results of our review of Harris County attorney payments for indigent defendants. This engagement was requested at Commissioners Court on September 29, 2020. The objectives of the engagement were to:

- Determine authoritative guidance surrounding requirements of court-appointed attorneys for indigent defendants.
- Identify program year 2018 and 2019 payments to court-appointed attorneys for indigent defendants.
- Determine compliance with Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §174.11 and §174.28.
- Determine compliance with Texas Code of Criminal Procedure (CCP) §26.04(f) and 26.044.

This memo will distinguish between the State District Courts and the Harris County Courts at Law.

Overview

The CCP states that an indigent defendant is entitled to have an attorney appointed to represent him or her in any adversary judicial proceeding that may result in punishment by confinement and in any other criminal proceeding if the court concludes that the interests of justice require representation. CCP defines indigent as a person who is not financially able to employ counsel.¹

In 2001, the 77th Texas Legislature passed the Fair Defense Act creating the blueprint for distribution of indigent defense grant funding from the State of Texas to local governments through the creation of the Task Force on Indigent Defense (now known as the Texas Indigent Defense Commission (TIDC)). The Fair Defense Act requires that all criminal courts in Texas adopt formal procedures for providing appointed attorneys to indigent defendants, allowing for prompt appointment of qualified attorneys.²

The TIDC awards Formula Grants to eligible Texas counties to help meet constitutional and statutory requirements for indigent defense and to promote compliance with standards adopted by TIDC.³ Harris County has received Formula Grants from TIDC annually since 2002 with an average award amount of approximately \$2.7 million over the respective period. TIDC also provides additional improvement grants to assist counties in developing new, innovative programs or processes to improve the delivery of indigent defense services. The County received a notable grant for approximately \$600,000 to develop an improved system for processing attorney fee claims in 2014.

TAC §173.301 requires a grant recipient to designate grant officials. In a 2020 Harris County Resolution adopted on October 8, 2019, the County Judge was designated as the Authorizing Grant Official and the County Auditor was designated as the Financial Officer. The TIDC Statement of Grant Award for the Fiscal Year (FY) 20 Formula Grant states that the grant officials understand that violation of any term of the grant may result in the TIDC halting, recovering, or barring Harris County from future or current grants.

The justice system in Harris County is comprised of various types of courts that handle different cases such as civil law, criminal law and family law. This project focused on the criminal felony and misdemeanor, and juvenile courts. These courts can be grouped into the three primary areas for the purposes of this report:

- Harris County Criminal Courts at Law: These courts are administered by Harris County and handle misdemeanor criminal cases that occur within Harris County.
- Felony State District Courts: These courts are an extension of the State of Texas judiciary and handle felony cases. Harris County provides administrative support and funds the administrative operation of these courts.

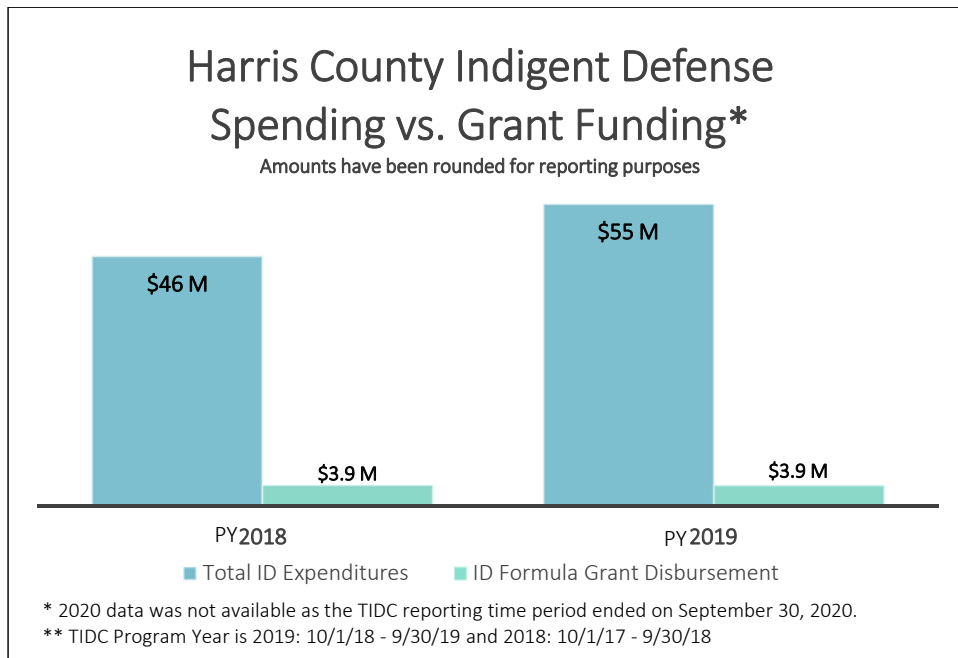

- State Juvenile District Courts: These are also an extension of the State of Texas judiciary. Harris County provides administrative support and funds the administrative operation of these courts.

The table below shows Harris County received approximately \$3.9 million in TIDC indigent defense Formula Grant funding in 2018 and 2019, in contrast to the \$46 million and \$55 million in total indigent defense expenditures for 2018 and 2019, respectively.⁴



On April 8, 2008, Harris County Commissioners Court voted to conduct a study on establishing a public defender office. After the reviews by county officials and work with the TIDC, Harris County received approximately \$12.5 million⁵ of total grant funds from TIDC to fund the Public Defender Pilot Program. As part of the grant acceptance, a Public Defender Board was established to oversee the office and hire the Chief Defender. The Chief Defender started on December 6, 2010. Departments within the office became operational at different times and by December 2011, the office was fully operational.⁶

Observations

Objective #1: Determine authoritative guidance surrounding requirements of court-appointed attorneys for indigent defendants.

Texas indigent defense is governed by statutes in the Texas CCP. The TIDC has set policies and procedures for county's that receive TIDC grant funding. Relevant CCP statutes and TAC rules are listed below.

Texas Code of Criminal Procedures

Article 26.04 (g) CCP states "a countywide alternative program for appointing counsel for indigent defendants in criminal cases is established by a formal action in which two-thirds of the judges of the courts designated under this subsection vote to establish the alternative program. An alternative program for appointing counsel in misdemeanor and felony cases may be established in the manner provided by this subsection by the judges of the county courts, statutory county courts, and district courts trying criminal cases in the county."

Article 26.04 (h) CCP, subject to Subsection (f), states "in a county in which an alternative program for appointing counsel is established as provided by Subsection (g) and is approved by the presiding judge of the administrative judicial region, a court or the courts' designee may appoint an attorney to represent an indigent defendant by using the alternative program. In establishing an alternative program under Subsection (g), the judges of the courts establishing the program may not, without the approval of the commissioners court, obligate the county by contract or by the creation of new positions that cause an increase in expenditure of county funds."

Article 26.047 (b) CCP states "The commissioners court of any county, on written approval of a judge of the juvenile court of a county or a county court, statutory county court, or district court trying criminal cases in the county, may appoint a governmental entity, nonprofit corporation, or bar association to operate a managed assigned counsel program."

The District Court's Standards and Procedures Plan for Appointment of Counsel for indigent defendants were adopted on October 16, 2001, by a two-thirds vote of the judges of the District Court Trying Criminal Cases. This Plan established an alternative program.⁷ A two-thirds vote of the judges of the District Court trying Criminal Cases is also required to amend the Plan. The judges of the Harris County Criminal Courts at Law and the Juvenile District Courts have also adopted plans for the appointment of counsel for indigent defendants of Harris County. The approved Courts' Plans contain items such as, minimum attorney qualifications, prompt appointment of counsel, and the attorney selection processes.

Texas Administrative Code

TAC Chapter 174 addresses some of the rules for indigent defense policies and standards. TAC §174.10 defines a contract defender program as the “system under which private attorneys, acting as independent contractors and compensated with public funds, are engaged to provide legal representation and services to a group of unspecified indigent defendants who appear before a particular court or group of courts. The appointing authorities for these programs are judges who have authority to establish an indigent defense plan and approve attorneys to represent indigent defendants in criminal cases under Article 26.04, CCP. The contracting authority is the county or counties that have the authority to conclude a contract and to obligate funds for the provision of indigent defense services.”

TAC §174.11 states that the contractor defender program requirements “applies to all contract defender programs in which legal representation is provided for a period of more than one week. Contract defender programs for terms of one week or less are governed by the alternative appointment programs provisions in Article 26.04(g)-(h) and subject to §174.28(c)(5) related to the distribution of appointments in assigned counsel systems. This subchapter does not apply to public defender or managed assigned counsel programs established and governed by Chapter 26, Code of Criminal Procedure.” TAC §174.11- 14 specifies the application of standards and contract procedures. TAC §174.15-25 specifies required elements of a contract for indigent defense services, including caseload maximums. TAC §174.28 requires a monitoring process for “compliance with the Fair Defense Act and Commission rules.” Harris County’s monitoring is performed by TIDC.

Objective #2: Identify program year 2018 and 2019 payments to court-appointed attorneys for indigent defendants.

Currently, there are separate indigent defense plans for the District Court Trying Criminal Cases, Harris County Criminal Courts at Law, and the Juvenile District Courts that are published on their websites and TIDC’s website.⁷ Within each plan, there are different methods for the judges to appoint attorneys for indigent defense. Methods of appointment are at judicial discretion and are listed below:

- Individual Case Appointment - a private attorney, acting as an independent contractor, is assigned an individual case.
- Term Assignment Method - a private attorney, acting as an independent contractor, is assigned to provide legal representation for indigent defendants for a period of time lasting more than one week but no more than one year.
- Limited Term Assignment Method - a private attorney, acting as an independent contractor, is assigned to provide legal representation for indigent defendants for a period of one day or one week.

The table below depicts a summary of TIDC’s indigent defense expenditures for assigned counsel, contract counsel (*term assignment greater than 1 week but less than 1 year*) and the Public Defender’s Office (PDO). Harris County spent \$1 million in 2019 and \$980,875 in 2018 on limited term assignment fees, which is included below in “TIDC Total Assigned Counsel.”

Objective #3: Determine compliance with Texas Administrative Code §174.11 and §174.28.

As stated previously, TAC §174.11 applies to all contract defender programs in which legal representation is provided for a period of more than one week. Article 26.04 (h) CCP states that in establishing an alternative program under Subsection (g), the judges of the courts establishing the program may not, without the approval of the commissioners court, obligate the county by contract or by the creation of new positions that cause an increase in expenditure of county funds.

TAC §174.28 requires a monitoring process for “compliance with the Fair Defense Act and Commission rules.” On October 7, 2016, TIDC issued their *Policy Monitoring Review of Harris County’s Felony Indigent Defense Systems*. TIDC’s *Policy Monitoring Review* stated, “The district courts must implement a system meeting the TIDC’s Contract Defender Rules for all term assignments exceeding one week. A notification for application is currently used, but the courts need to formalize contracts with defense attorneys.”⁸ Harris County currently does not have written contracts for term and limited term assignments. Although there are no contracts currently in place, a draft contract template has been submitted to the County Attorney’s Office for review. **Appendix C** is a sample contract for counties that is published on TIDC’s website.

The Harris County Misdemeanor Courts (County Criminal Courts at Law) received approval to create a Managed Assigned Council (MAC). The MAC was partially funded by a \$2.2 million grant award in December 2019 from the TIDC.⁹ The creation of a MAC was the County Criminal Courts at Law’s response to an October 2016 TIDC Monitoring Review requirement regarding compliance with the term assignment system.¹⁰ An Executive Director was approved by Commissioners Court on October 13, 2020 to lead the Harris County Office of Managed Assigned Counsel. Harris County Misdemeanors Courts have established a MAC, which is exempt from the TAC §174.11 requirement regarding contracts for term assignments greater than 1 week.

The Auditors performed a detailed analysis of the Harris County District Courts’ Fair Defense Act Management System (FDAMS) data to determine if there were any notable trends that indicated specific attorneys were being assigned consecutive, limited term assignments (LTA) instead of term assignments that require a contract. Our analysis identified 5 instances of consecutive LTAs during September 11, 2017 - September 30, 2020, see table below.¹¹

Objective #4: Determine compliance with Texas Code of Criminal Procedure §26.04(f) and 26.044.

Effective September 1, 2019, subsection (f) of Article 26.04 CCP states that “in a county with a Public Defender’s Office (PDO), the court or the courts’ designee shall give priority in appointing that office to represent the defendant in the criminal proceeding, including a proceeding in a capital murder case. However, the court is not required to appoint the PDO if:

- The court makes a finding of good cause for appointing other counsel, provided that in a capital murder case, the court makes a finding of good cause on the record for appointing that counsel;
- The appointment would be contrary to the office's written plan under Article 26.044;
- The office is prohibited from accepting the appointment under Article 26.044(j); or
- A managed assigned counsel program also exists in the county and an attorney will be appointed under that program.”

Subsection (j) of Article 26.044 CCP states “a PDO may not accept an appointment under Article 26.04(f) if:

- A conflict of interest exists that has not been waived by the client;
- The PDO has insufficient resources to provide adequate representation for the defendant;
- The PDO is incapable of providing representation for the defendant in accordance with the rules of professional conduct;
- The acceptance of the appointment would violate the maximum allowable caseloads established at the PDO; or
- The PDO shows other good cause for not accepting the appointment.”

The Harris County’s PDO submitted its Plan to the TIDC pursuant to Article §26.044(b-1) CCP and Texas Government Code §79.036(a). This Plan was approved by Commissioners Court on October 22, 2013. The Plan states “caseload per attorney is consistent with those recommended by the National Advisory Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals. The maximum annual caseloads are 150 felonies per attorney, or 200 juvenile cases per attorney, or 25 appeals per attorney. Misdemeanor mental health cases are not to exceed 350 per attorney. Any changes to these caseloads must be made known to the PDO Board (Personnel Manual §10.4).”¹² At the time of fieldwork, the PDO had 105 attorneys, including the Chief Public Defender.

The Harris County District Courts Plan does not establish maximum annual caseloads as the PDO’s Plan does. If the Harris County District Courts were to utilize contracts for private attorney appointments, TAC §174.21 requires the contracts under a contract defender program (*legal representation provided for a period of more than one week*) to include caseload maximums. Specifically, TAC §174.21 states, “The contract shall set the maximum number of cases or workload each attorney may be required to handle pursuant to the contract, which may include a maximum caseload not exceeding the annual full-time equivalent caseload established by the Guidelines for Indigent Defense Caseloads and the Juvenile Addendum and Appellate Addendum” (Guidelines). Per the January 2015 Guidelines “for the delivery of reasonably effective representation attorneys should carry an annual full time equivalent caseload of no more than the following:

- 236 Class B Misdemeanors
- 216 Class A Misdemeanors
- 174 State Jail Felonies
- 144 Third Degree Felonies

- 105 Second Degree Felonies
- 77 First Degree Felonies”

See **Appendix B** for caseloads by private attorney for March 1, 2019 – February 29, 2020.

The Harris County District Courts Plan details standards and procedures for appointment of counsel for indigent defendants. Consistent with adopted procedures, each judge may choose any attorney or the PDO from the Lists of Qualified Attorneys assignment. The procedures shall take into account (1) the availability of the attorney or the PDO; (2) the individual qualifications of the attorney with respect to the nature of the case; (3) a reasonable and impartial allocation of appointments among the attorneys qualified to accept appointments.¹³

Section 9 of the Harris County District Courts Plan relates to Court Assignment of Attorneys. See **Appendix D**¹⁴ for a detail of that section. The most recent Plan changes were effective on October 8, 2020, and state “the County Public Defender shall appear on every requested list for every Court requesting.” Prior to this, the PDO was added to the list of available and qualified attorneys (Court List) based on the PDO’s availability setting in the FDAMS, as adjusted by the PDO.

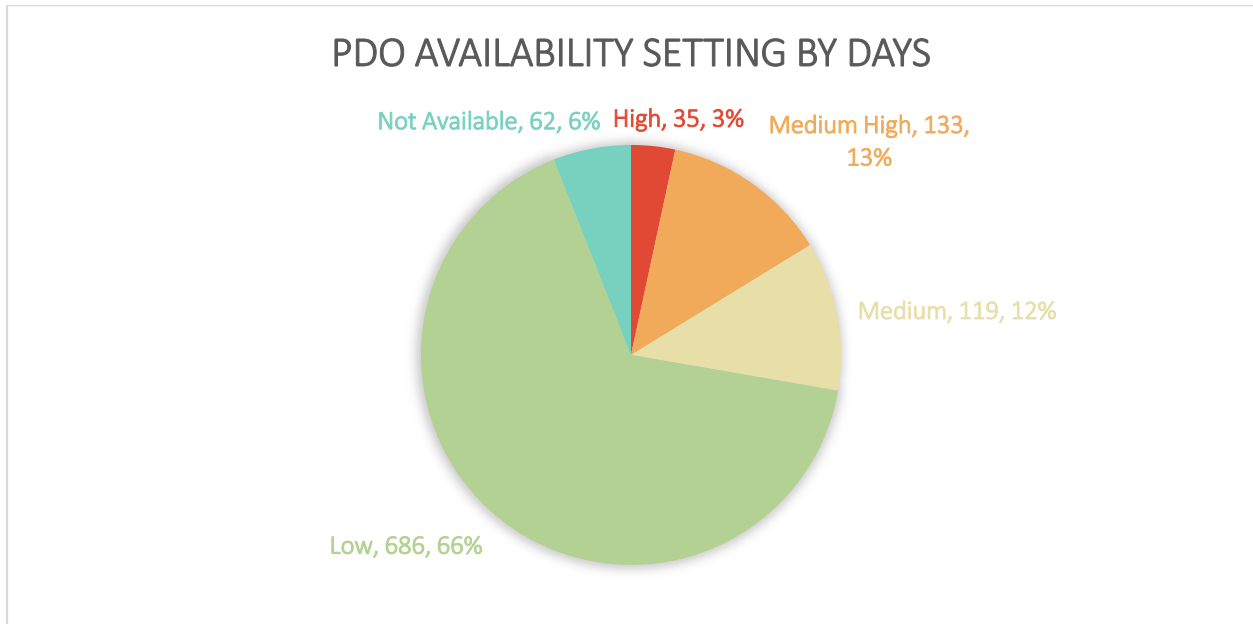
The table below depicts how the setting in FDAMS controlled the frequency of the PDO’s availability for appointment on the Court List for the period September 11, 2017 - September 30, 2020. For example, a low setting meant that the PDO’s office would only appear on 1 out of each 4 lists generated on any given day, across all courts. A medium setting would increase the appearance to 2 out of every 4 lists, across all courts.

The pie chart below shows the PDO’s availability status per FDAMS by the number of days and percentages for the period September 11, 2017 - September 30, 2020.



Using data from FDAMS, the table below capture the amount of times the PDO was selected by the District Courts for assignments when the PDO appeared on the Court List for attorney selection.

Conclusion

Private attorneys acting as independent contractors for the County that are assigned to provide legal representation for indigent defendants for a period of time lasting more than one week should have signed contracts with the County that comply with TAC Subchapter 174. Noncompliance with this requirement could jeopardize future TIDC grant awards.

District Courts’ assignment of attorneys should follow the recently updated Section 9 of the Harris County District Courts Plan to ensure the PDO appears on every Court requested list to support compliance with Subsection (f) of Article 26.04 CCP.

Appendix A

The Justice Administration Department’s Dashboard provides the percentage of cases being handled by the PDO and private attorneys. In contrast, the table below captures PDO and private attorney appointments by assignment types as obtained from the FDAMS for the period 9/11/2017 - 9/30/2020. Limited term and term assignments can include multiple cases.

Appendix C

TIDC Sample Contract for Counties engaging private indigent defense attorneys

CONTRACT FOR LEGAL SERVICES TO CRIMINAL DEFENDANTS

This Contract is made by and between Morris County, Texas (“County”), a political subdivision of the State of Texas, and _____, State Bar No. _____ (“Attorney”) on the ____ day of _____, 20____. The purpose of this agreement is for the County to provide legal services to indigent defendants in the Criminal Courts of Morris County. Attorney has agreed to provide all services requested, except for those hereinafter described.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Term. The term of this Contract shall be for eleven (11) months, beginning on November 1, 2007 and ending on September 30, 2008, unless sooner terminated as set forth herein.
2. Compensation. Attorney will receive the sum of \$_____ per month, for a total of \$_____ for the term of the contract (unless the Contract is terminated sooner).
3. Case Load. Attorney may handle up to a maximum of 485 cases per year (i.e., a maximum of 200 felonies, 250 misdemeanors, 25 juvenile cases, and 10 appeals). If the total volume of cases requires that Attorney be appointed to handle more than 485 cases a year, Attorney will be compensated for work on such extra cases at the rate of one and one-half times the normal rate for indigent defense cases in each respective county, or the reasonable fee that the presiding judge finds by order to be appropriate. In these cases, the Attorney must present a form listing the time spent on each case, together with the activities for which the time was incurred, to the presiding judge for approval.
4. Expense Reimbursement. Attorney may receive reimbursement for reasonable and necessary expenses, including expenses for investigation, and other experts, consistent with Texas Code of Criminal Procedure art. 26.05(d), and travel outside of Morris County, separate from the Attorney’s compensation. Travel expenses (mileage, etc.), are eligible for reimbursement in accordance with Morris County’s policy on travel reimbursement for employees. All expenses to be reimbursed must be itemized in writing, supported by invoices and/or vouchers, and submitted to the presiding judge for approval.
5. Independent Contractor. Attorney is not an employee of the County, and is, at most, an independent contractor, who shall complete the requirements of this Contract by Attorney’s own means and methods of work, and in accordance with the Attorney’s professional legal judgment, which shall be in the exclusive charge and control of the Attorney, and is not subject to control or supervision of the County or any judge, except as specified in this Contract. THE DEFENDANT IS YOUR CLIENT – NOT THE COUNTY. YOU

MUST PROVIDE COMPETENT, ZEALOUS LEGAL SERVICES TO EACH CLIENT IN ACCORDANCE WITH YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES UNDER THE TEXAS DISCIPLINARY RULES OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT AND THE TEXAS CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.

6. Standard of Performance.

- (a) Attorney will provide all services required by Senate Bill 7 as passed by the 77th Session of the Texas Legislature in 2001. (As it amends the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures).
- (b) Attorney shall provide competent, zealous legal services to each client in a professional, skilled manner consistent with the Attorney's responsibilities under the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct and the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure.
- (c) Attorney shall ensure continuity of representation of the client unless relieved or replaced in accordance with art. 26.04(j)(2) of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure.
- (d) Attorney shall not assign, subcontract or delegate any part of the services to be provided by the Attorney under this Contract.
- (e) Attorney must submit a monthly progress report to be approved by the Morris County Judge prior to any payment being made under this Contract, in accordance with art. 26.05 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. The report must include the number of cases disposed of in the previous month and the types of cases (adult felony, adult misdemeanor, and juvenile) as well as the number of cases currently open and assigned by the courts. The County Judge may require other information, which is necessary and relevant, and may confer with the presiding judge on any case.
- (f) Attorney must maintain the minimum qualifications to practice law in the state of Texas, and must immediately inform the County Judge of any change in the status of the Attorney's licensure. The Attorney must provide the County with proof of licensure in good standing upon request.
- (g) Attorney agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Morris County from any and all claims arising from the delivery of professional services under this contract.
- (h) Attorney must report to the County Judge the number of continuing legal education hours completed.
- (i) Attorney shall maintain an office in Morris County, Texas and shall maintain the ability to receive facsimile correspondence twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.
- (j) Attorney must provide quality, effective legal assistance and representation to clients to whom Attorney is assigned.
- (k) Attorney shall complete all cases once representation is commenced during the term of the contract, unless the attorney is relieved or replaced in accordance with Article 26.04(j)(2), Code of Criminal Procedure. Attorney will be compensated for these uncompleted cases on a case-by-case basis according to the SB7 approved plan.

-
- (l) Attorney is prohibited from accepting any payments from a client or third party for legal services provided in a case assigned under this contract.
 - (m) Attorney is prohibited from releasing confidential attorney-client information or work product related to any case covered by this contract, except when authorized by the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct.
 - (n) Attorney agrees he or she will not run for county attorney, within two years of the termination of this contract.
7. Conflict. In the event of a conflict of interest between Attorney and any defendant, Attorney shall present evidence to the court in which the case is pending, and if ordered by the Judge presiding, be allowed to withdraw from representation in that case. Such withdrawal shall not affect the other terms of this agreement.
8. Termination. This Contract may be terminated by the County for good cause, with the approval of the majority of the County and District Judges serving Morris County. If a reason for termination is found to exist by any of the judges or the program director, written notice will be given to Attorney, and a private meeting will be held with the Attorney and judges present to discuss the relevant issues, and, thereafter, the judges will vote on the termination of Attorney's contract.
- (a) County may terminate this agreement if Attorney closes his active office for the practice of law in Morris County.
 - (b) County may terminate this agreement if Attorney fails to perform the duties required by this agreement. Such failure must be supported by judicial findings of that failure.
 - (c) Attorney may terminate this agreement if County fails to make timely payments hereunder.
 - (d) Attorney may terminate this agreement if, for reasons beyond the control of Attorney, Attorney is unable to perform the duties required hereunder.
 - (e) This agreement may be mutually terminated for any force majeure or any change in the law, which makes the agreement moot.
9. Administration. The District Judges and the Morris County Judge will provide oversight and monitoring to assure that Attorney performs as required under this Contract. Nothing herein shall be interpreted as creating a right or remedy against the County, the Morris County Judge, or the District Judges on the part of any person.
10. Disputes. Venue of any proceeding arising under or with regard to this Contract shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction in Morris County.
11. Additional Terms and Conditions.
- (a) The cases to be handled under this Agreement shall be non-capital murder cases in which the death penalty is sought. The appointments hereunder may include juvenile cases.
 - (b) Attorney will be responsible for three different categories of cases in County and District Court, which include appeals:

Level One. Felonies

Level Two. Misdemeanors

Level Three. Juveniles

- (c) A determination that Attorney has given false information in the materials submitted to the County in response to the Request for Qualifications will be grounds for immediate cancellation of this Agreement under the procedures set forth above.
- (d) Falsification of any report, invoice, billing documentation or other submission by the Attorney will be grounds for immediate cancellation of this Agreement under the procedures set forth above. In addition, such could subject the Attorney to both professional discipline and criminal prosecution. Therefore, it is very important that submissions be thorough and truthful.

Appendix D

Section 9 of the Harris County District Courts Indigent Defense Plan

COURT ASSIGNMENT OF ATTORNEYS.

- 9.1 Individual Case Assignments: When submitting a request for an attorney, the court's request shall designate: (1) the ranking of the attorney needed; (2) the date of the assignment; (3) any special requests (bilingual, etc.). The computer shall provide to the court ten randomly selected names, including the HCPD, per request. A court requesting an attorney for individual case assignment may submit two requests at a time provided that the requests specify different criteria. A court may not submit another request until at least one attorney has been assigned from one of the one or two pending lists and the remaining names from that list have been returned to the attorney pool. See also 3.4. The HCPD shall be placed in the automated system to appear for every request as allowed by these rules.
- 9.2 Term Assignments: Beginning at 3:30 pm on the first Thursday of December, courts may submit requests for attorneys available for term assignments. Courts may make assignments from among the available attorneys who meet the court's criteria for term appointments.
- 9.3 Limited Term Assignments: Courts may submit requests for attorneys available for limited term assignments at any time prior to 3:00 p.m. on Thursday of each week. Courts shall designate the term and date of the assignment.
- 9.3.1 The computer program shall equally divide the pool of attorneys available for limited term assignments among the requesting courts. The program shall provide the randomly selected names to the requesting courts beginning at 3:30 p.m. on Thursday.
- 9.3.2 The Court shall make at least one limited term assignment from the provided names and promptly, but not later than noon on Wednesday, return the remainder to the pool available for limited term assignments.
- 9.3.3 In the event the selected attorney becomes unavailable, or an additional attorney is needed, the court may submit an additional request. The computer shall provide the court with no more than **six (6)** randomly selected names from the remaining pool of available attorneys after noon on Wednesday.
- 9.3.4 The Harris County Public Defender shall appear on every requested list for every Court requesting.
